


THE LOST COIN

A 1922 Professional Coin Grading Services MS67 closed winged American Eagle silver dollar...WOW! My mother would exchange dollar bills for silver dollars that customers would bring into my uncle's drug store in Brooklyn, NY, where

she worked. She had pouches upon pouches of early 1900 silver dollars. I remember "borrowing" one from her collection; she had so many that she wouldn't miss one.

The time was the mid-1970s, and Roller Disco was the craze in NYC, as well as throughout the country. My cousin Carl and I had become quite 'the skaters'. We were invited to all the top Roller Skating Rinks in New York and New Jersey to uplift the crowds and show off our talents. Remember that silver dollar that I borrowed from my mom? It became my lucky coin; I would have it in my pocket wherever I went. One night at a skating rink in NYC, I was skating backward at a high rate of speed. I didn't see that a young lady had fallen right at the turn. I crashed into her and fell. Embarrassed by the situation, I sprang to my feet and went to help her, apologized, and off I went. After all, the music was still thumping. A few minutes later, I checked the fob of my pants where I kept my coin, and it was gone! It must have fallen out of my pocket when I fell. I slowly skated around the rink looking for the lost coin, but found nothing! I asked a few people if they had picked up the coin, but again nothing! At closing, I asked the manager if I might look around and see if I could find it, now that the lights were on. I frantically searched, and then gave up. It's gone, oh well. Reflecting on that attitude and mind set, I realized it didn't really cost me anything. After all, I had "borrowed" it from my mom.

Have you ever lost something? The instant feeling of dread, anguish, urgency, panic, and stress can grip you, if it is something of great value.

Luke 15:8-9 says, "Or what woman, having ten silver coins, if she loses one coin, does not light a lamp, sweep the house, and search carefully until she finds it? And when she has found it, she calls her friends and neighbors together saying, 'Rejoice with me for I have found the piece which I lost!"

I never did find that coin. Recently I discovered that the coin I lost is very rare. There wasn't a large number minted that year, and it is now worth over \$17K. I did not put much value in the coin, nor did I search with urgency to find it, because it wasn't really mine. I am so glad that our Lord and Savior Jesus Christ thinks that every one of us is precious to Him, and it doesn't matter what value we place on ourselves, or what value others place on us. He will not stop looking, pursuing, finding those that are lost. To Jesus, each one of us is priceless, and even worth dying for. He will go to the ends of the earth to find just one, for whom He paid the ultimate price with His blood shed at Calvary. When one person gives his life to Christ, he rather returns his life to Christ. Luke 15:10 tells us, "Likewise, I say to you, there is joy in the presence of the angels of God over one sinner who repents."

Jesus relentlessly comes after us, because to Him we are precious. We have great value and are of tremendous worth to Him. Let us return our life to Him, and discover that true value He sees in us, the very reason He is seeking for us!

Deborah Duffy's professional background includes working in Human Resources, Insurance and Finance for the past 30 years. She received her BA from Douglass College, a master's degree from the Institute of Management and Labor Relations at Rutgers University Graduate School and is a Certified Compensation Professional. During the pandemic, Deborah also supported the doctor's medical practice where they treated Covid patients with therapeutics that saved the lives of over 8,000 patients worldwide. Being a part of those efforts to tend to the needs of thousands

of people in need has been a life-changing experience for her.

While profoundly influenced with swordsmanship in her youth, Deborah began fencing at the age of 14 and fenced throughout college and her professional life. She studied the weapon of a Foil, and was coached by Vasyl Stankovich, a Fencing Maestro from the Soviet Union, who was a 2 time Olympic and 5-time world championship fencer. Deborah was able to achieve the status of a junior Olympic fencer, an Allstate

ranking, a 3-time state foil champion, and was awarded the Scholar-Athlete Award as a member of the Rutgers University Women's Fencing Team. While coaching the Bernards High School Fencing Team, they won the state championships.

It's a joy to see them having fun while they're here and being able to fix any issues that come up during their stay.

5. What is something you are most proud of?

Keeping the camp operating for so many years. Being able to see the kids enjoy it year after year.

6. What was your favorite tradition at FDM?

Singings hymns from the black hymn books at lunch.

7. What are you planning to do once you retire?

Learning to relax. I have been working since I was 15. It's going to be an adjustment.

8. How often do you plan to visit us?

As often as I get called (laughing)

9. If you could ask for one item from FDM, what would it be?

A second picnic pavilion so in the summer more groups can enjoy the property.

10. What are your favorite Bible verses?

John 3:16 For God so loved the world that he gave his one and only son that whoever believes in Him should not perish but have everlasting life.

began in Borken (presently in Poland) in 1899, with the call of four dedicated and determined Deaconesses who sought to serve the Lord. They lived a service-oriented, celibate life, and proclaimed salvation through Jesus alone. Later, they relocated to Vandsburg (also in Poland), and by 1906 numbered over 300 Sisters. Other Motherhouses and a Brotherhouse were established in Germany, and at the peak of this ministry, around the 1970s, the numbers of Sisters, Brothers, Employees and Volunteers numbered around 5,000. In 1929, the first two Sisters arrived at New York to minister to German immigrants who were adjusting to their new life in America, and as the result of the Lord's rich blessings

was established. Today this international movement can be found in over 12 countries, with the favor of the Lord resting upon it. Though ministry styles change to meet the needs of that generation, bringing salvation, discipleship and wholeness through Jesus is our goal. Glory be to God!
